Answer: A full house, which is a three of a kind and a pair.

3. The Manhattan Project is a code name for the development of what: an airplane or the atomic bomb?

Answer: The atomic bomb. The name was given because the project began in Manhattan.

4. “Good to the Last Drop” is the slogan for what brand of coffee: Chock Full o’ Nuts or Maxwell House?

Answer: Maxwell House. The brand has used the slogan since 1915.
